

















What does this mean for VA Voluntary Service? For teens who volunteer, social change can be a bonus! Teens want to: Hang out with friends Connect through mobile technology (the average teen exchanges 5,000 texts per month) Avoid commitment Decide to go last minute Avoid showing up early Will never stay 'til the end TELL TEENS THEY'LL ACTUALLY BE ABLE TO CHANGE SOMETHING!!!!






